To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

~~Whereas~~ In pursuance of the provisions of the Revised Statutes of the United States, Chapter Six, Title Thirty-two, and legislation supplemental thereto, there have been deposited in the General Land Office of the United States the Plat and Field Notes of survey and the Certificate, No. 563, of the Register of the Land Office at Redding, in the State of California, accompanied by other evidence whereby it appears that The Iron Mountain Investment Company

did, on the fifth day of November, A. D. 1904, duly enter and pay for that certain mining claim or premises, known as the Monte Cristo Consolidated Mine, consisting of the Claremont and Monte Cristo lode mining claims,

designated by the Surveyor General as Survey No. 4138, embracing a portion of Sections twenty-six and thirty-five in Township thirty-three north of Range six west of the Mount Diablo Meridian, in the Flat Creek Mining District, in the County of Shasta and State of California,

in the District of Lands subject to sale at Redding,
and bounded, described, and platted as follows, with magnetic variation as hereinafter stated:

Beginning, for the description of the Claremont lode claim, at corner No. 1, a pine post four feet long, four inches square, marked C 1 M C 4138, with mound of stone, from which the northwest corner of Section thirty-five in Township thirty-three north of Range six west of the Mount Diablo Meridian, bears north sixty-nine degrees, nine minutes west one thousand two hundred fourteen and ninety-eight-hundredths feet distant;

Thence, first course, magnetic variation eighteen degrees, five minutes east south one degree, forty-five minutes west one hundred fifty-two and four-tenths feet to discovery; four hundred fifty-two and four-tenths feet to corner No. 2, a pine post four feet long, four inches square, marked C 2 M C 4138, with mound of stone;

Thence, second course, magnetic variation eighteen degrees east, south eighty-eight degrees, fifteen minutes east one thousand five hundred feet to corner No. 3, a pine post four feet long, four inches square, marked C 3 M C 4138, with mound of stone;

Thence, third course, magnetic variation eighteen degrees, fifteen minutes east, north one degree, forty-five minutes east six hundred feet to corner No. 4, a pine post four feet long, four inches square, marked C 4 M C 4138, with mound of stone;

Thence, fourth course, magnetic variation eighteen degrees, fifteen minutes east, north eighty-eight degrees, fifteen minutes west one thousand one hundred seventy-two and three-tenths feet to corner No. 5, a pine post four feet long, four inches square, marked C 5 M C 4138, with mound of stone;

Thence, fifth course, magnetic variation eighteen degrees, fifteen minutes east, south sixty-seven degrees, thirty minutes west three hundred fifty-nine and four-tenths feet to corner No. 1, the place of beginning; the survey of the lode claim, as above described, extending one thousand five hundred feet in length along said Claremont vein or lode:

Beginning, for the description of the Monte Cristo lode claim, at corner No. 1, identical with corner No. 5 of said Claremont lode claim, also marked M C 1 M C 4138, situate on line 3 - 4 of the Westbourne lode claim, Survey No. 4059, from which corner No. 3 bears north sixty-seven degrees, thirty minutes east four hundred eighty-one and six-tenths feet distant, and said section corner bears north seventy-eight degrees, thirty-eight minutes west one thousand four hundred ninety-six and four-tenths feet distant;

Thence, first course, magnetic variation eighteen degrees, fifteen minutes east, south eighty-eight degrees, fifteen minutes east three hundred feet to discovery; six hundred feet to corner No. 2, a pine post four feet long, four inches square, marked M C 2 M C 4138, with mound of stone;

Thence, second course, magnetic variation eighteen degrees, twenty minutes east, north five degrees west one thousand two hundred eighty-seven feet to corner No. 3, a pine post four feet long, four inches square, marked M C 3 M C 4138, with mound of stone;

Thence, third course, magnetic variation eighteen degrees, fifteen minutes east, north eighty-eight degrees, fifteen minutes west six hundred feet to corner No. 4, a pine post four feet long, four inches square, marked M C 4 M C 4138, with mound of stone;

Thence, fourth course, magnetic variation eighteen degrees, twenty minutes east, south five degrees east two hundred sixty-two and three-tenths feet intersect line 3 - 4 of Survey No. 3543, the Busy Bee lode claim, at north forty-nine degrees, forty-five minutes west four hundred thirty-seven and eight-tenths feet from corner No. 4; six hundred seventy and thirty-six-hundredths feet intersect line 4 - 5 of said Survey No. 3543, at south sixty-seven degrees, thirty minutes west three hundred twenty-three and fifteen-hundredths feet from corner No. 4; six hundred seventy-four and seventy-eight-hundredths feet intersect line 2 - 3 of said Westbourne lode claim, at north forty-nine degrees, thirty minutes west six hundred fifty-five and three-tenths feet from corner No. 3; one thousand two hundred eighty-seven feet to corner No. 1, the place of beginning; the survey of the lode claim, as above described, extending one thousand two hundred eighty-seven feet in length along said Monte Cristo vein or lode; - expressly excepting and excluding from these presents, all that portion of the ground, hereinbefore described, embraced in said mining claim or Survey No. 3543, and said Westbourne lode claim, Survey No. 4059, and also all veins, lodes and ledges throughout their entire depth, the tops or apexes of which lie inside of such excluded ground; the premises, herein granted, containing thirty-three and three-hundredths acres, more or less:

NOW KNOW YE, That there is therefore hereby granted by the United States unto the said

The Iron Mountain Investment Company

and to **its successors** and assigns, the said mining premises hereinbefore described, and not expressly excepted from these presents, and all that portion of the said **Claremont and Monte Cristo**

vein, lode, or ledge, and of all other veins, lodes, and ledges throughout their entire depth, the tops or apexes of which lie inside of the surface boundary lines of said granted premises in said **Survey No. 4138,**

extended downward vertically, although such veins, lodes, or ledges in their downward course may so far depart from a perpendicular as to extend outside the vertical side lines of said premises: *Provided,* That the right of possession to such outside parts of said veins, lodes, or ledges, shall be confined to such portions thereof as lie between vertical planes

drawn downward through the end lines of said **Survey No. 4138,**

so continued in their own direction that such planes will intersect such exterior parts of said veins, lodes, or ledges: *And provided further,* That nothing herein contained shall authorize the grantee herein to enter upon the surface of a claim owned or possessed by another.

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD said mining premises, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities, and appurtenances of whatsoever nature thereunto belonging unto the said grantee above named

and to **its successors** and assigns forever;

subject, nevertheless, to the above-mentioned and to the following conditions and stipulations:

First. That the premises hereby granted, *with the exception of the surface,* may be entered by the proprietor of any other vein, lode, or ledge, the top or apex of which lies outside of the boundary of said granted premises, should the same in its dip be found to penetrate, intersect, or extend into said premises, for the purpose of extracting and removing the ore from such other vein, lode, or ledge.

Second. That the premises hereby granted shall be held subject to any vested and accrued water rights for mining, agricultural, manufacturing, or other purposes, and rights to ditches and reservoirs used in connection with such water rights as may be recognized and acknowledged by the local laws, customs, and decisions of the courts. And there is reserved from the lands hereby granted a right of way thereon for ditches or canals constructed by the authority of the United States.

Third. That in the absence of necessary legislation by Congress, the Legislature of **California,** may provide rules for working the mining claim or premises hereby granted, involving easements, drainage, and other necessary means to its complete development.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I, **Theodore Roosevelt,**

President of the United States of America, have caused these letters to be made Patent, and the seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed.
